An Update on CenCom

CenCom is now Kitsap 911. They are no longer a department of Kitsap County, but are now a separate public agency. Their radio call sign will remain as **CenCom** for responders. Interesting Facts

- Our 911 center is now occasionally receiving emergency requests for service by text message. About 40 times
 per year, citizens text in emergencies that they would otherwise be unable to communicate with
 dispatchers. Some of these requests come from hearing-impaired citizens.
- Over 330,000 calls are processed each year by our 911 center. Over 35,000 of these incidents annually are Fire/EMS related. Kitsap 911 is always looking for new dispatchers and call takers. An outline of their hiring processes is included in the link above.
- The percentage of calls coming into Kitsap 911 from landlines has fallen to only 26%. Most callers are now using cell phones to report emergencies.

Please remember, when a call doesn't go well because information didn't get shared appropriately, we should try to figure out how we might do better next time. Chief Weninger is the CKFR representative on the Kitsap County Strategic Advisory Board (SAB) to Kitsap 911. Chief Oliver is our representative at County Operations Chiefs who regularly addresses these issues as they arise. Commissioner Muhleman is on the Board of Directors at Kitsap 911 so if we need to seek clarification or change, we have methods to improve. Kitsap 911's leadership has shown a great willingness to improve on their processes and performance. Most of all, when things go right on a difficult call because the dispatcher did a great job, please pass along KUDOS as we need to ensure they are not only hearing from us when there is a problem.



All Personnel List

For several months I have worked with Tammy Sargeant to create a list of all our personnel on CKShare. The reason I built this list was to assign training based on organizational role (think Combat Volunteer vs. EMS Only Vol., vs. Mechanics, etc.).

Tammy used to send this list out along with the seniority rosters as word documents to all line Officers. She also provided a spreadsheet with this information to several individuals who needed it at different times based on projects they were working on. Since this information is now available to everyone in the organization she will no longer be doing this.

There are many benefits to having this list on CKShare. We now have a list of all active personnel (Career, and Volunteer), their contact information, title in the organization, union status, radio call sign, etc., etc.,

We have also started tracking committee assignments, and project areas. I need to provide training on how to use it so you can easily find the information you need, however, it is very easy to filter the list in the column titles to narrow down what you are looking for.

The additional benefit is that all the information is available to anyone who has a logon to CKShare. With more eyes on it we will be made aware of any mistakes quickly so it is more accurate.

Only myself, HR, and Chief Danskin have the ability to edit this list, but HR has ultimate authority over it.

I have created several very useful public views based on the data in this list, they are:

1. The "All Active Personnel" view

a. This is a list of everyone who is active in the organization, sorted by last name, although you can sort by any column you choose, including reverse sorting the list. Columns that are key to this view are "Member title", "Divisions", and "Union Status".

2. The "Volunteer" View

a. Shows all Volunteers personnel

3. The "2819 Seniority" View

a. Overall seniority irrespective of rank

4. The "Career Seniority" View

- a. Keep in mind that career refers to everyone who is employed by CKFR
- 5. The "Career Seniority in Position" View
- 6. The "Volunteer Seniority" View
- 7. The "Probationary" View

a. This view shows all personnel who are on probation, both new hires, and newly promoted. It shows the start and end date of probation



Mother of drowned teen raises money for rescue effort

CENTRAL KITSAP — A year after his death, Lucas Weaver's name will live on inside the fire district that helped recover his body, thanks to a \$5,000 donation from his mother.

Early last year, Weaver was fishing with friends at Big Beef Creek when he fell into the water. Central Kitsap Fire and Rescue responded, but attempts to retrieve his body were <u>stymied by steep</u>, <u>slippery terrain and rapid-moving water</u>.

Crews eventually found Lucas after nearly a day on the creek and calling out every CKFR staff member available. The 18-year-old was the fourth Klahowya Secondary School student to die in less than two years.

That day in February was "a fuzz," for Lucas' mother, Tasha Weaver, who thanked CKFR commissioners and staff Monday for helping to find her son's body.

Inspired to "focus my energy on something positive," Weaver said she decided to raise money for the fire district to mark the anniversary of Lucas' death. The money, which officially was donated to CKFR's Medic One Foundation, will be used to pay for water rescue equipment and training.

"At first it just started off as a thank you, an appreciation for everything that they did that day," Weaver said. She decided to earmark it for water rescue after learning about the district's interest in expanding those programs.

While Central Kitsap has the most exposure to moving water in the county, most of those are smaller bodies of water like creeks, according to deputy fire chief John Oliver. Those can be dangerous but usually only in the event of heavy rains or flooding, Oliver said.

Swift-water rescues aren't a common occurrence, but the district will be adding training for both open-water and swift-water rescues using money from the bond voters approved in 2015, he said.

Oliver — who helped run a water-rescue program for a fire district in Clackamas County, Oregon — said that Weaver's donation could be used to further the expansion of CKFR's water-rescue programs, including purchasing equipment or training firefighters how to perform swift-water rescues.

"I don't exactly know what the funds are going to go to, but when we do identify that we want it to be something meaningful for family," Oliver said.

Weaver raised the money through individual donations and partnerships with local businesses. Tessio, a pizza and whiskey bar in Silverdale, and Brewberry Coffee on Newberry Hill Road each donated a percentage of their sales for one day to the fundraiser. Combined with individual donations, the total came to just over \$5,000.

"That's where most of the money came from, was just people just dropping off a little bit here, a little bit there," Weaver said.

As part of the donation, Weaver requested that a program or piece of equipment be named "Dream Weaver," after Lucas. Her son "was a dorky hippie" and enjoyed the Gary Wright song and other old songs, she said. Plus, the moniker includes their last name.

It's a request the fire district says it'll be sure to oblige.

"I do everything that I do, I try to make him proud, of me, somehow," Weaver said.

County partners with school district in upgrade to athletic fields

(Port Orchard, WA) - The Central Kitsap School District approved a memorandum of understanding March 22 with the Kitsap County Parks Department. The agreement grants CKSD use of the six tennis courts at the Kitsap County Fairgrounds, located adjacent to the district's Olympic High School. The school's tennis program has utilized and shared the use the facilities for years. The Kitsap County Commissioners are scheduled to approve the tennis court MOU in April.

The agreement will transfer liability and the responsibilities of renovating, managing and maintaining the courts to the school district. The agreement will not affect the public use of the courts, which will continue on a first-come, first-served basis, outside of scheduled school functions.

"The ability of the county to develop partnerships such as these, to maximize community resources for the benefit of the community, is a terrific model for efficient and effective government," said Kitsap County Commissioner Ed Wolfe. "The recent agreements create a great win-win for the schools and community." He anticipates that Kitsap County Parks and the school district will continue to discuss possibilities for similar agreements.

The agreement follows an inter-local agreement the county signed with the school district in 2016 pertaining to the upgrading of athletic field serving Klahowya Secondary School, built on county parkland within Newberry Hill Heritage Park. Again, the district assumed liability of the facilities and funding for all upgrades. Since then, the district has prepared developmental plans for a \$2.4 million project to improve the fields, provide accessible access, and possibly upgrade restroom and concession buildings. The county reviewed the plans and provided written consent for the project to move forward, as is required in the agreement.

"Continuing this decades-long partnership aids our efforts to provide quality athletic facilities for our students and our community," said Central Kitsap School District Superintendent David McVicker. The school district and county have worked together on the athletic complex next to Olympic High since 1976.

Along with other community partners such as the Public Facilities District, the county and school district continue to discuss a possible extension of a similar agreement to additional athletic facilities at the fairgrounds.

This week during a two-day presentation, Deputy Chief Oliver instructed the Kitsap County Incident Management Procedures (KCIMP) to Battalion and Deputy Chiefs from numerous Kitsap County Fire Agencies.




Live by all of the above

At the event, FirstNet was joined by **Randall Stephenson**, AT&T chairman and CEO, who said, "We are honored to work with FirstNet to build a network for America's police, firefighters and EMS that is second to none. This is an unprecedented public-private investment in infrastructure that makes America a leader and public safety a national priority."

As FirstNet Board Chair **Sue Swenson** noted in our <u>news release</u>, "This public-private partnership is a major step forward for the public safety community as we begin building the broadband network they fought for and deserve. FirstNet and AT&T will deliver high-speed connectivity to help millions of first responders operate faster, safer, and more effectively when lives are on the line."

Agreement terms

The following are high-level terms of the 25-year agreement announced today between FirstNet and AT&T:

- _ FirstNet will provide 20 MHz of high-value, telecommunications spectrum and success-based payments of \$6.5 billion over the next five years to support the Network buildout – FirstNet's funding was raised from previous FCC spectrum auctions;
- AT&T will spend about \$40 billion over the life of the contract to build, deploy, operate and maintain the network, with a focus on ensuring robust coverage for public safety;
- _ Additionally, AT&T will connect FirstNet users to the company's telecommunications network assets, valued at more than \$180 billion.

This unique partnership brings together FirstNet, public safety and a global technology team with a proven track record and commitment to the public safety community. Together, FirstNet and AT&T will move with precision and urgency to deliver this much-needed infrastructure to first responders.
