Rear Adm. John Tammen is a native of Washington Township, New Jersey. He graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in 1984 with a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering and earned his master's degree in engineering management from Old Dominion University.

His career as a nuclear submarine warfare officer includes assignments aboard USS Plunger (SSN 595) as a division officer, USS Nevada (SSBN 733) as the engineer officer and then USS Providence (SSN 719) as the executive officer. Subsequent command assignments include commanding officer of USS Georgia (SSBN/SSGN 729), from March 2002 until December 2004, and commodore of Submarine Squadron (SUBRON) 19 from July 2008 until July 2010.

Ashore, he has served as officer in charge of Combat Systems Training Team on the staff of Commander, Submarine Group 5; squadron engineer on the staff of Commander, SUBRON-17; Force Nuclear Power officer for the Atlantic Submarine Force; executive assistant to the director Submarine Warfare Division, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations (OPNAV N77); deputy division chief for Joint Capabilities Division (Joint Staff J8); section head for Platforms, Payloads and Budget in Undersea Warfare (OPNAV N97); military assistant and chief of staff for the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Operational Energy Plans and Programs (OEPP), the Honorable Sharon Burke; and deputy director for Undersea Warfare (OPNAV N97).

As a flag officer, he served as the deputy director, Plans and Policy (J5) at U.S. Strategic Command.

Tammen is currently the commander, Submarine Group 9, Naval Base Kitsap, Washington.

His personal decorations include Defense Superior Service Medal (two awards), Legion of Merit (four awards), Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), Navy Commendation Medal (five awards), Navy Achievement Medal (two awards) and various unit awards.

Since the SOP review and posting process moved to Human Resources, we have been working to clarify and simplify the way these documents are created and communicated with you. We realized that significant overhaul was required to meet that goal. As the result, the former "Procedures for Developing SOP's" has been broadened to include how to create and revise all Official District Documents. It is now called "Development and Communication of Official District Documents." There are several changes in our process to note, including:

- A review or revision of these documents is required every two years by the appropriate Division Head responsible for the policy or procedure.
- Templates for all of these documents have been standardized and can be found on CK Share via the drop down menu under the "Official District Documents" tab.

All District SOP's can be navigated to on CK Share by selecting the Official District Documents tab, click on the link to Standard Operating Procedures (SOP's). Once on the SOP site page, you will see several folders for different divisions. You can search in each folder, or search key words in the search box directly above the folder list.

Mariner's Home Opener welcomes our Local 2819 Honor Guard






Air Ambulances: Taking Patients for a Ride

For-profit air-ambulance companies too often pick up people who don't need air transport—and leave families with huge bills that insurance won't pay

Jennie Stout, a nurse in Ocala, Fla., was finishing an afternoon shift when she got a panicked call from home. Her 13-year-old daughter, Ashlyn, had tripped and fallen into smothered embers left over from burning leaves in their backyard, scorching her hands, knees, and shins.

Ambulance paramedics on the scene when Jennie arrived said that Ashlyn should be sent by helicopter to a burn center in Gainesville for fast treatment.

Jennie was surprised: The hospital was only about 40 miles away and the burns didn't seem extensive to her. But in that situation, she recalled, "I'm a mom first," so she didn't question the decision.

Ashlyn left the hospital after four days and was back at school within two weeks. The Stouts' insurer, Blue Cross and Blue Shield, covered her hospital bills and outpatient therapy.

But two months later, the family got another shock: A notice from Med-Trans, the air-ambulance company, telling them that the transport was \$24,000.

It turns out that medical-emergency helicopters are often <u>"out of network"</u> and not fully covered by insurance. Blue Cross and Blue Shield paid only \$5,700, leaving the family with the balance: \$18,300.

Today, four years after the accident, Ashlyn has only a few minor scars. But the unpaid balance has a left a lasting mark on the family. They hired a lawyer to challenge the bill, which has now gone to a collection agency.

And the debt has hurt Jennie's credit score, making it more difficult to get a loan for needed repairs to the aging roof on the family's house.


"I have never not paid a bill in my life," Jennie says. "I am not paying a dime because on principle the whole thing is just wrong."

Team dynamics can make or break a meeting. Have you ever been in a meeting where people interrupt each other, introduce new ideas when they should be building on the conversation, and repeat someone else's point just to be heard? These communication issues waste time and energy, and usually lead to more meetings to correct misunderstandings, reiterate decisions, or soothe hurt feelings and interoffice tensions.

But there is one thing you can do that can make a significant difference to improving the <u>quality of</u> <u>time</u> you spend in meetings: Listen. By improving the way you listen and understand others in meetings, you can make that time more productive by reducing repetition and misunderstandings.

If simply listening can solve so many problems, why is it so hard to practice? One reason is we're listening to interrupt with our ideas or rebuttals. We listen so we can jump in with our perspective. Or we're worried we'll forget what we want to say if we listen for too long. We focus on our own communication, rather than listening to understand others.
