“Water Rescue from Hood Canal”

At 1:33 pm this afternoon, Central Kitsap Fire and Rescue were alerted to a Coast Guard report of an emergency beacon one mile west of Scenic Beach State Park.

Multiple units from CKFR responded with crews from Station 56, located on Seabeck Highway, arriving first.

Firefighters and the Battalion Chief located the kayaker one mile from shore, drooped over the bow of his kayak. Crews were able to secure a private vessel to assist with the rescue and CKFR's Boat 51 arrived and staged at the boat launch as a backup vessel.

Working with the Coast Guard helicopter, one male patient was rescued and transported by boat back to the Misery Point boat launch where he was evaluated for minor injuries and released.

Factors contributing to this successful rescue:

- The kayaker was wearing a life jacket

- The kayaker carried and activated an automated emergency beacon

- A private citizen assisted CKFR with use of their private boat

- The quick response from the Coast Guard with their helicopter

ENSURING ECONOMIC PROSPERITY, BETTER SCHOOLS AND TRANSPORTATION NETWORKS IN SILVERDALE

Central Kitsap Commissioner Ed Wolfe—June 2017 Newsletter

When it comes to the retail hub of Kitsap, Mason and Jefferson counties, **what happens in Silverdale does not stay in Silverdale**. It affects everyone who lives, works or shops in the region. Major construction projects for Harrison Medical Center and the Central Kitsap School District will change the view of Silverdale beyond just a retail center. To balance growth with expansion of healthcare and educational opportunities, I am taking the lead on a strategic transportation effort to improve transportation connections throughout the Silverdale core.

Harrison Medical Center Harrison recently got an important green light from the state Department of Health for its new \$550 million primary acute-care facility in Silverdale. This hospital project will bring hundreds of jobs to Silverdale, both during and after construction, as well as more convenient access to services and emergency care for Kitsap, Mason and Jefferson residents. As part of the first stage of construction, a parking garage is being built now and a ground-breaking on the hospital will likely occur in September.

Central Kitsap Schools The design has been finalized and permitting through Kitsap County is underway now for the CK High School and Middle School campus. The new schools are going to be amazing for Silverdale and Central Kitsap students, and serve as centers for the community at large. Construction began in April for a 45,000+ square-foot addition to Klahowya Secondary School. Site preparation is happening now (pictured), with major construction starting this summer. The Central Kitsap Community Council and I hosted a discussion with CK School Superintendent David McVicker and Business & Operations Director Doug Newell at the June 7 CKCC meeting. We talked about the new construction projects at various schools and how they will impact education, traffic and the community. More information will follow in the next newsletter.

EXHIBITION OF THE CHAIN OF SURVIVAL BY THE 51B HIGH-PERFORMANCE RESUSCITATION TEAM



On June 10 at 10:06 a.m., the 51B High Performance Team put on a live resuscitation event in front of a crowd of 250 attendees, including the CEO of Harrison, doctors, surgeons, ICU, ER, cath lab, cardiac arrest survivors, and the public, in the Kitsap Mall. The mock arrest began with an 11-year-old girl walking with her father, who then collapsed to the ground in the middle of the mall. She called 911 live (displayed on the speakers to the crowd) and began CPR on her father:

- CENCOM deployed M51, E51, L51, BN51 live.
- PulsePoint went off to the crowd.
- High-performance resuscitation performed by the CKFR 51B team.
- They then did a transfer of care to Harrison Hospital staff (emergency room and cardiology).
- Immediately following the event, I summarized the entire chain of survival and focused on the strongest link of the chain: bystander recognition, activation of 911, and hands-only CPR.
- Following the summary, Engine 41 and Ladder/Rescue 51 led the Save a Life March around Silverdale.
