RESPONSE SAFETY

A message from the Safety Committee

As firefighters, we are often confronted with unique challenges in regards to emergency response. Our largest vehicle is well over 60,000-lbs, nearly 12' tall and 41' long. Even our smaller apparatus such as our ambulances are heavy in comparison to the typical passenger vehicle. All CKFR members who operate emergency vehicles receive significant training on vehicle systems, safe operation, laws and regulations unique to emergency vehicles, and defensive driving. This is so that we can ensure the best probability for our responders to arrive safely and expeditiously in order to mitigate the emergencies to which we are responding.

Though we have numerous laws and policies regulating our driving practices, many decisions are left to the discretion of the driver and the officer in the response vehicle. In any circumstance, the driver is expected to operate the vehicle with "due regard for the safety of all persons" (RCW 46.61.035 [4]). Additionally, drivers and officers must make risk management decisions that are reasonable and prudent by appropriately prioritizing personnel and vehicle safety.

In many areas, we encounter unimproved roadways or access roads that are very narrow. In these circumstances it is imperative that the following considerations be made in an effort to minimize vehicle damage and the possibility of personal injury:

- Always consider the urgency of your response in relation to the hazards present to life and property. It may be most appropriate to park the vehicle and walk rather than risk damage or injury.
- During nighttime response, use as much lighting as possible and practical.
- Consider clearance around vehicle and avoid branches and other protrusions that may damage the vehicle.
- If taking the apparatus off of a designated roadway/driveway/ access road, ensure that the ground is stable and that the apparatus won't become stuck or unnecessarily damage property (e.g. mud, uneven terrain, septic systems, fences, landscaping).
- Ensure that any bridges are marked appropriately for apparatus weight, before crossing over them.

At 4:50 am this morning, Central Kitsap Fire and Rescue crews responded to a report of a single vehicle in the water near the 2800 block of Tracyton Beach NW, Bremerton. Upon arrival, firefighters observed a passenger car, upside down in approximately 3-6 feet of water. Law enforcement officers were already on scene and were performing CPR on a male patient. CKFR Apparatus Operator and Rescue Swimmer, Sascha Ebert, donned his wet suit and entered the water. He did a full swim around the vehicle, checking the passenger, driver, and back seat compartments. He also checked the surrounding area for any additional victims that may have been ejected from the vehicle. No other victims were located.

The male patient was transported to Harrison Hospital in Bremerton.



Restoration of CKFR's Regular Fire Levy

Ballots will be mailed out on October 19, 2018. Election Day is November 6, 2018.

In November, Central Kitsap Fire & Rescue (CKFR) voters will be asked to restore the Regular Fire Levy to the \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation (AV). This tax will replace the Maintenance & Operations Levy (M&O) that was passed in 2015.

Background

CKFR's regular property tax levy is the primary funding source for the maintenance and operations of the fire district. CKFR's current M&O Levy expires on December 31, 2019. The M&O Levy currently contributes \$1.8 million each year toward staffing and operations (currently at \$0.21 per \$1000 AV). If successful, based on a conservative five-year estimate using average changes in AV, the Lid Lift will produce revenues similar to that of the M&O Levy.

Why a Lid Lift?

CKFR formed an internal stakeholder economic summit committee recommend potential solutions to future budgetary shortfalls. This committee included the District's Commissioners, management team, IAFF Local 2819, and CKFR volunteers. After evaluating the current and future revenue and expense trends, the committee concluded the District should seek a Permanent Lid Lift for the Regular Property Tax Levy up to the \$1.50. This recommendation was presented CKFR's Citizen's Advisory Committee and the Board of Fire Commissioners.

What will this cost?

Much of this levy restoration is the current rate that citizens are already paying today (\$1.32). Using the 2018 AV and the median CK home value (\$296,680), the Lid Lift is estimated to cost \$4.38/month or \$52.58/year for a CK homeowner.

What does this additional revenue mean to CKFR?

Due to the accelerated demands of and increasing costs of providing fire and emergency response services, restoring the levy lid to \$1.50 will allow CKFR to maintain adequate service levels. This Lid Lift replaces the funding for the fire district after the expiration of the M&O Levy beginning in 2020.

If successful, during 2019 only, the District would collect on the final year of the M&O Levy and Levy Lid Lift. Additional funds received during 2019 will be earmarked for purchasing two new transport medic units (with equipment); a new water tender; a new fire engine; equipment for earthquake emergency management and operational preparedness; and critical infrastructure earthquake evaluations, engineering, and imminent repairs.

What if the Lid Lift fails?

This Levy Lid Lift must be voter-approved and requires a fifty percent (50%) majority for approval. If the measure does not pass, the District will need to seek an alternative funding source to replace the M&O Levy at an election in 2019, which would be more expensive depending on which election.

A failure of the Levy Lid Lift would mean a reevaluation of the District's budget and priorities. Without a replacement funding source for the M&O Levy, the District will not be able to maintain its current service levels. CKFR will be forced to consider reductions in staffing, maintenance to fire and EMS vehicles, fire station and capital facilities improvements, as well as in training programs for personnel. These reductions will impact the level of service to CKFR citizens and cripple the District's response times.







The Central Kitsap community continues to experience tremendous growth, evident by the expansion of Harrison Hospital's campus in Silverdale, a multitude of new housing developments, and the new commercial center at the Trails. From 2016 to 2017, the demand for service increased by 6.5%. Additional funding is needed if CKFR is to continue providing adequate service in the future.
