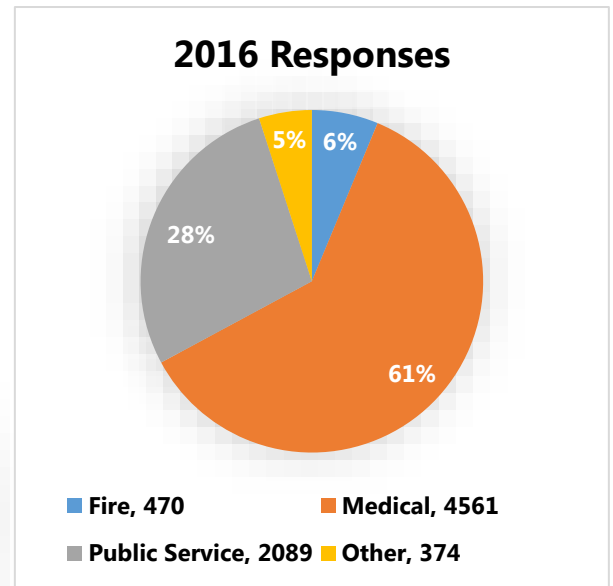
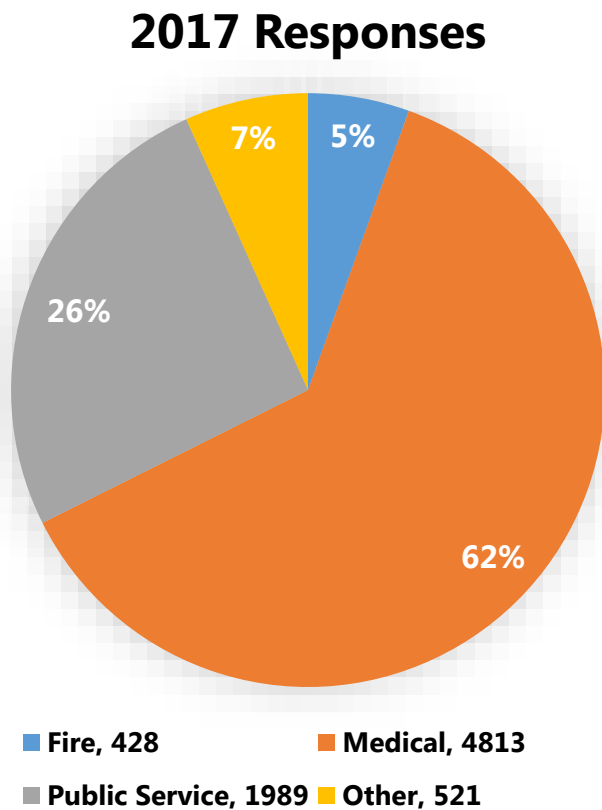

Introduction

All data presented in this report is derived from Central Kitsap Fire & Rescue’s (CKFR) records management system (RMS). Consistent with the statute (RCW 52.33), the data used herein has gone through 317 validation points before it was used to produce these performance measurements.

In 2017, Central Kitsap Fire & Rescue responded to a total of 7,982 calls. Of those calls, 4,881 were EMS related (62.10%). Furthermore, CKFR completed 4,567 EMS transports last year. The chart below depicts the breakdown of the total responses that CKFR personnel responded to for all priority calls (emergency and non-emergency).

Responses, All Priorities



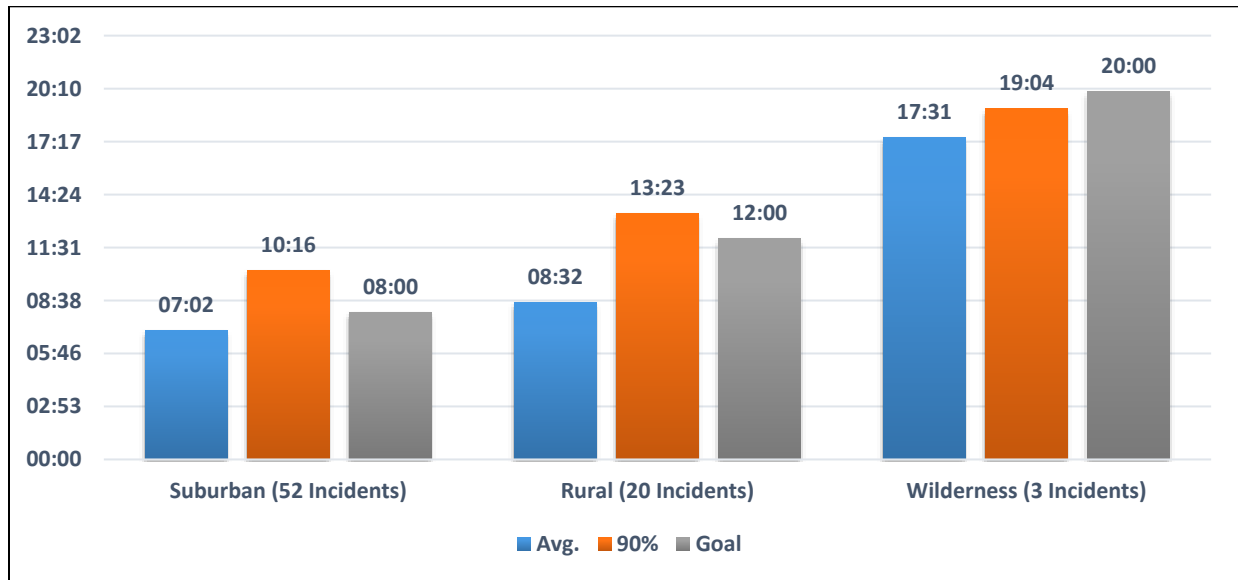

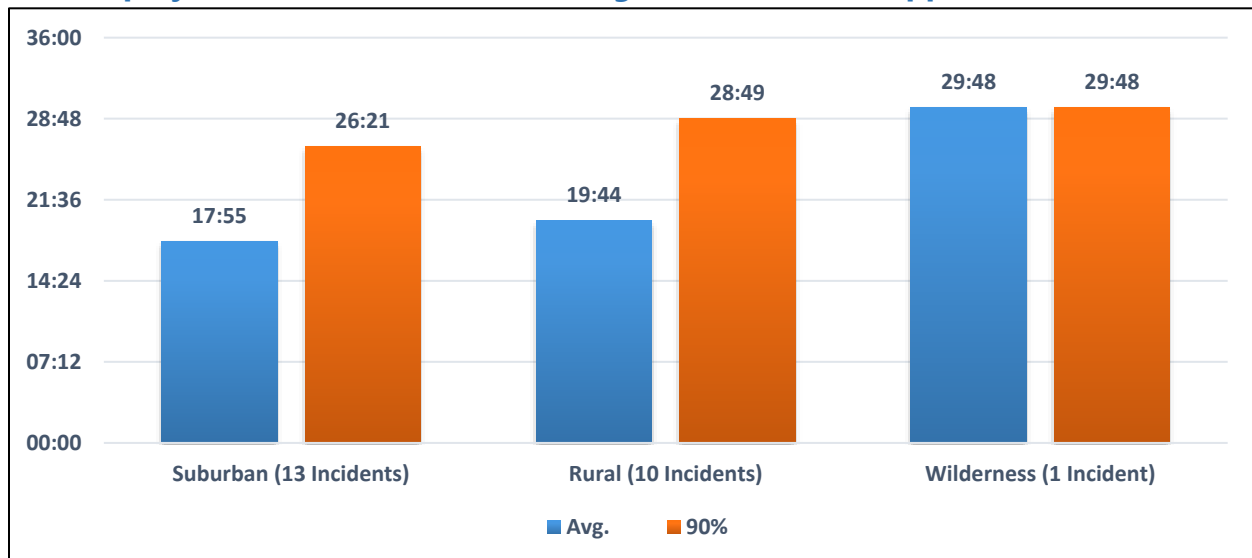

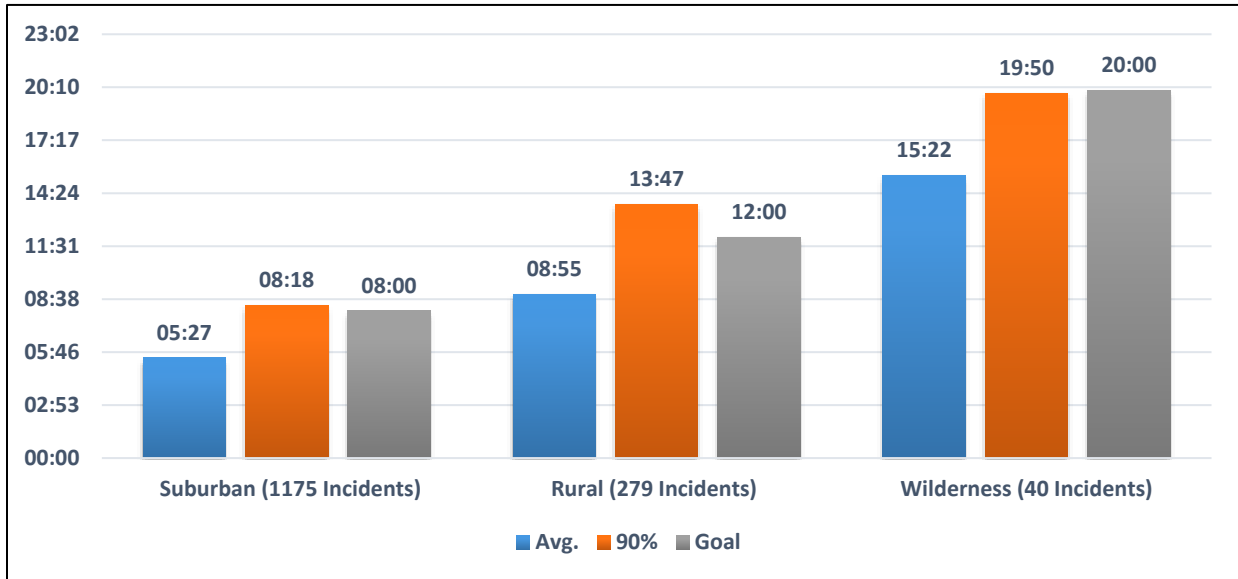
First Engine Company at Priority 1 & 2 Fire Suppression Incident



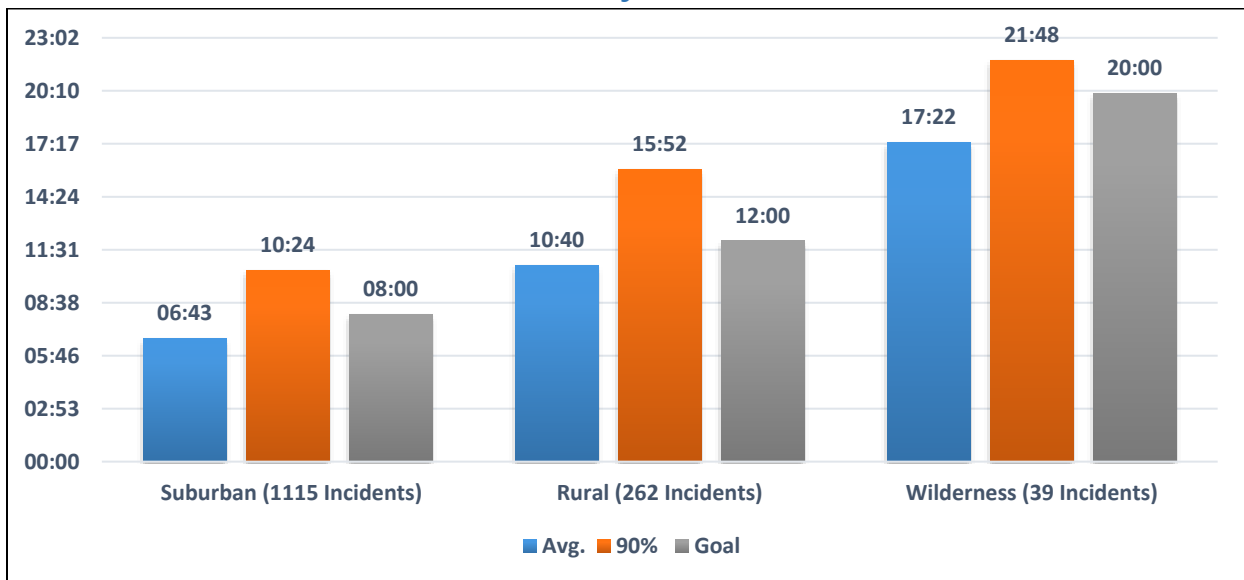
Deployment of Full First Alarm Assignment at a Fire Suppression Incident

Predictable Consequences

Currently, CKFR meets the average response times in all geopolitical zones (suburban, rural, and wilderness), but like most other Fire Districts, CKFR falls short of meeting national 90% fractal goals. The main contributing factor is the continued growth and expansion of the Fire District's population into the rural and suburban areas which is causing an increased demand for service.

CKFR successfully passed 3 voter-approved ballot measures in 2015 that secured funding for additional staffing and for vehicle/equipment upgrades to better meet National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards. As a result, the additional funding allowed CKFR operations to improve response times overall. With the Central Kitsap community developing at an accelerated rate and more citizens moving into the area, the Fire District will need to seek additional funding in the near future to maintain adequate levels of service to the community.

Plan of Action

By securing a stable funding source for the future, the Fire District can evaluate and move forward in key areas that are directly related to response performance:

- CKFR fire stations (improvements and relocation)
- Additional staffing
- Equipment upgrades
- Training for personnel

CKFR will continue to implement measures to improve response times for the citizens and each of these considerations is another step towards achieving our goal. For more information, please refer to the CKFR Strategic Plan.
